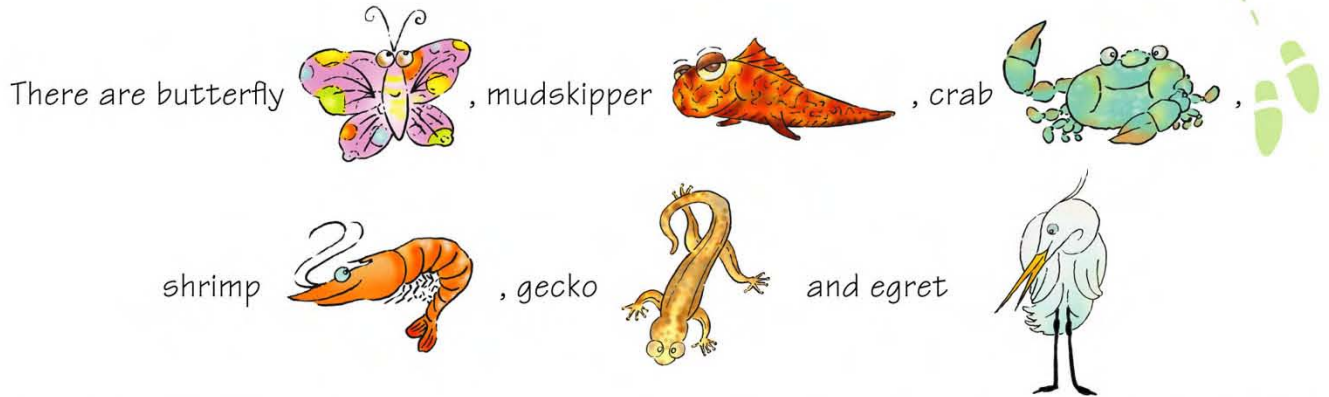
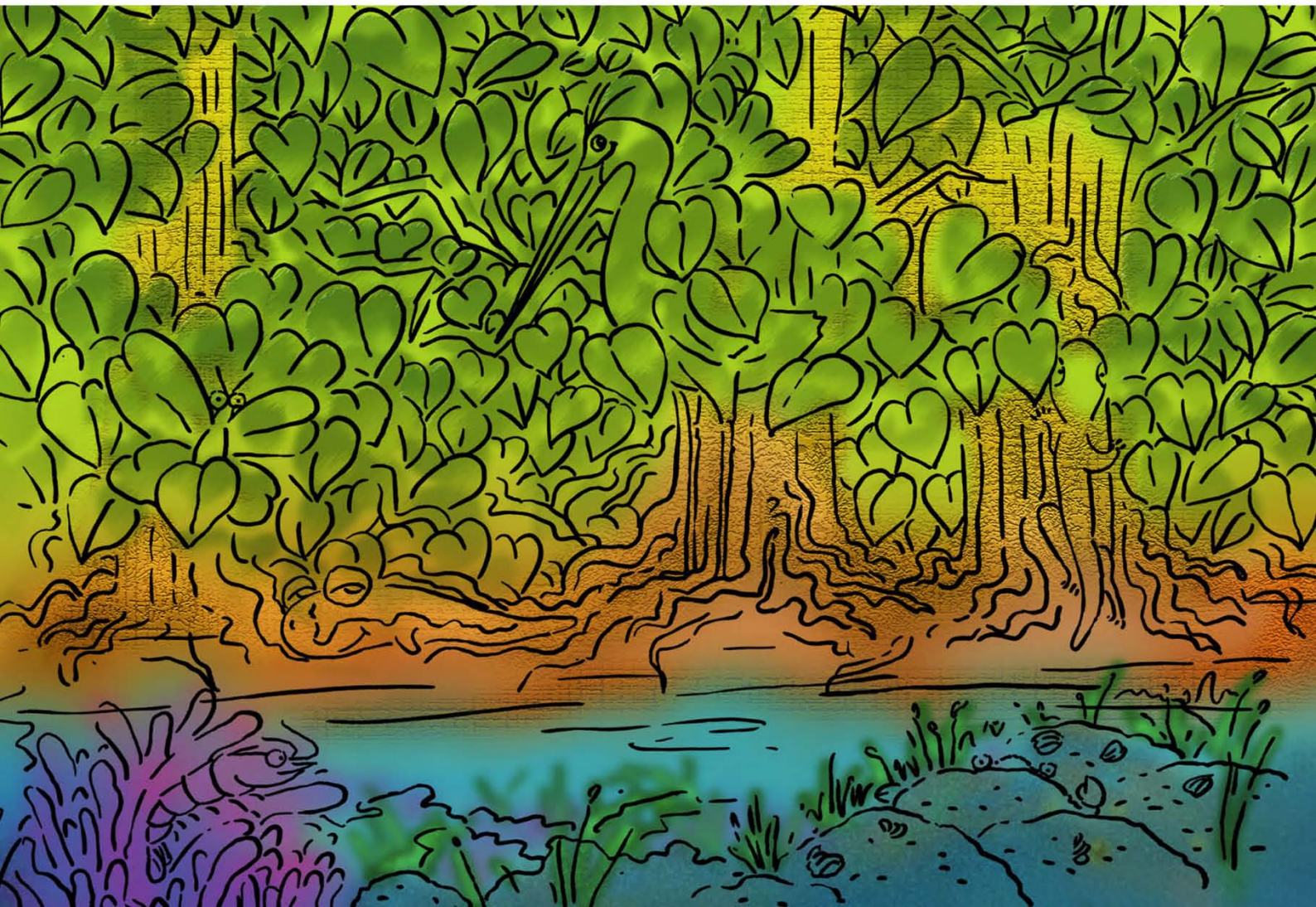


Mai Po Marshes
